**Spotlight on Mitacs: HQP Funding for Partnered Research and Innovation Projects in all Disciplines**USask faculty working with a partner organization can benefit from <u>Mitacs funding</u> to support student positions. With a rolling deadline, non-competitive process, and support throughout the application process, Mitacs is an excellent way to fund student projects.

Mitacs offers two internship-structured funding opportunities for post-secondary students (undergraduate and graduate), postdoctoral fellows, and recent graduates:

- Accelerate supports small and large research projects for post-secondary students, including entire Masters and PhD programs
- <u>BSI</u> supports technical and social innovation projects such as development and knowledge translation in all disciplines. BSI is most useful for part time and summer student projects and for recent graduates to work on a partner organization's innovation challenge.

Mitacs-funded projects must give opportunity to students to collaborate with the partner organization(s) outside of the academic lab or office. Eligible partners include:

Companies incorporated in Canada, municipalities, hospitals, and most not-for-profit organizations
are eligible as partner organizations. Several organizations can provide funding and collaboration in
one application.

The Mitacs Indigenous Pathways program is applicable to both programs.

**Funding Details:** 

Funding amount: minimum \$5,000 (scalable) per 4 months, no upper limit. Leverage ratio dependent on

priority sector (1:1, 1:2 and 1:3 leverage options).

Partner organization contribution: min \$2500 (scalable) per 4 months

Project duration: 4 months-4 years

Deadline: rolling intake

**Selection:** not a competitive process. Faculty can schedule a meeting to explore examples in their discipline, information on how to find a partner organization, and for support in

the application process.

#### NSERC Alliance Grant Update - ECR Voucher Pilot Program

The <u>NSERC Alliance</u> grants program has recently been updated, and if you are an ECR, you can now apply for a \$10,000 voucher to replace some or all of the required cash contributions from your partner organizations. Meaning, the \$10,000 will be counted as part of your cash contributions from partners in calculating NSERC's funding toward the project. The pilot program will provide vouchers to (up to) 200 eligible researchers.

You will be required to submit a Letter of Intent and your CV through the NSERC online system by February 22, 2024. If NSERC receives more than 200 Letters of Intent, it will choose recipients through a random selection process.
