

Introduction to Research Security

Research Security is a growing area. The Federal government has new requirements for researchers engaging in partnerships to conduct their research. Briefly, there are 2 Canadian research security policies which require researchers to conduct risk assessments. This involved a process of "Know Your Research" and "Know Your Partner." In this process, we work with you to identify potential risks to the research and, if necessary, devise a mitigation plan. In this session, you will learn about these new requirements and resources that can assist in addressing the risk assessment. Lisa Belhumeur will lead this session. DARE is designed to provide incoming faculty and ECRs with the practical supports to give our USask researchers a competitive edge. One way we do this is through our **grant development programs**. This session will provide information about our grant development programs, focusing on our upcoming development program for NFRF's Exploration Grant that will run this summer.

Have you had a great research idea but were afraid it was too risky and would never get funded? The **NFRF Exploration Grant** might be the answer! The objective of the Exploration grant is to **inspire high-risk, high-reward,** and **interdisciplinary research.** Specifically, the Exploration stream supports projects that:

- **bring disciplines together** beyond traditional disciplinary or common interdisciplinary approaches;
- propose to explore something new, which might fail; and
- have the potential for significant impact

This grant is a great opportunity for Early Career Researchers (ECRs), as a proportion of awards equal to the proportion of applications that are led by ECRs will be reserved for these researchers (an eligible ECR submission must have both the NPI and Co-PI (if applicable) as ECRs).

SSHRC Metascience and AI Postdoctoral Fellowships Competition Now Open

SSHRC is pleased to announce that it is partnering with the United States' <u>Alfred P. Sloan Foundation</u> and the United Kingdom's UK Research and Innovation to support the Metascience and AI postdoctoral fellowships. As part of this joint initiative, SSHRC will support up to four Canadian postdoctoral fellows working at Canadian institutions, at \$140,000 over two years.

Eligibility Requirements

- Candidates must hold a Ph.D. or equivalent degree in chemistry, computer science, Earth system science, economics, mathematics, neuroscience, physics, or a related field.
- Candidates must be members of the faculty of a college, university, or other degree-granting institution in the U.S. or Canada.
- Candidates must be tenure-track, though untenured, as of September 15 of the nomination year.
- Candidate's faculty position must carry a regular teaching obligation.

Early career researchers in the social sciences and humanities (with particular emphasis on philosophy, sociology of science, and metascience) who are interested in understanding the implications of artificial intelligence (AI) for the science and research ecosystem are invited to apply.

Submissions Due: April 10, 2025, by 5:00 p.m. (eastern)

Funding amount: \$140,000 over two years

Arthritis Society Canada - Stars Career Development Award

The <u>Stars Career Development Award</u> was created to help firmly establish the career of early career investigators. This salary and research funding represents a three (3) year commitment by Arthritis Society Canada, together with an additional three (3) year commitment by the applicant's Host Institution. The program provides funding to support research programs aligned with Arthritis Society Canada's 2020-2027 Research Strategy. Arthritis Society Canada will be accepting applications relevant to five research priority areas: arthritis pain, OA, IA, childhood, and work.

To be eligible, an applicant must be within 5 years of their first academic appointment and within 10 years of their most recent graduate or health professional degree. You can review the full eligibility criteria here.

Grant recipients may obtain up to three years of support for research in the biomedical, clinical, health systems and services, population and public health sectors.
